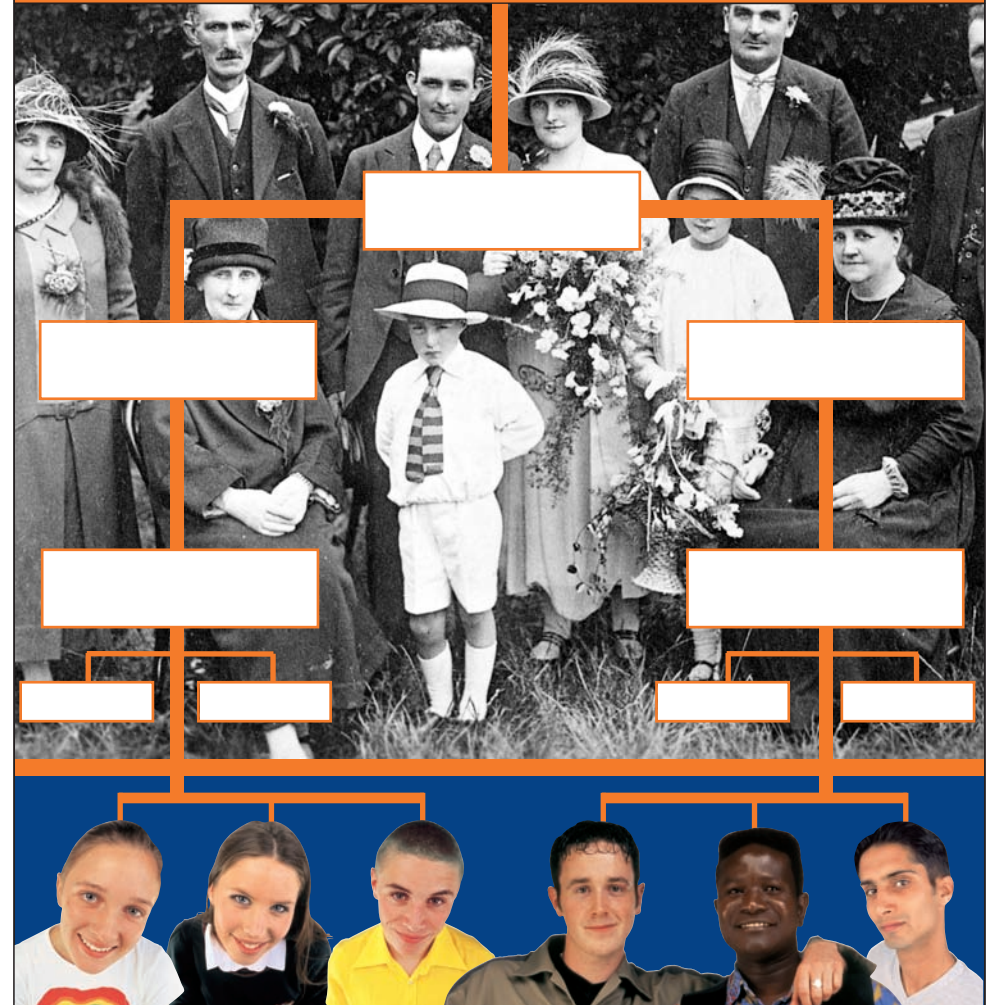

GENERAL PRINCIPLES

Establish what work, if any, has been done already on the family.

Obtain as much information as possible from living members of the family.
Keep clear records of information found, sources searched, etc.

Work backwards - from the known to the unknown. Details of a family member alive in 1901 can make a good starting point.

Remember it is often necessary to make appointments to visit Record Offices, Libraries, Family History Centres etc.

CIVIL REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS, DEATHS AND MARRIAGES

Introduced into England and Wales on 1st July 1837.

Registration took place locally, information forwarded to London quarterly.

Full birth certificate gives: when and where born, name, sex, name of father, name of mother and her maiden surname, occupation of father, signature, description and residence of informant.

Marriage certificate gives: when and where married, names of both partners, their age, condition (e.g. spinster), occupation, residence at time of marriage, fathers' names and occupations, witnesses' names.

Death certificate gives: when and where died, name, sex, age, occupation, cause of death, signature, description and residence of informant.

The original registers cannot be seen. Information is only available in the form of a certificate which has to be purchased.

If you can supply the references, i.e. the volume and page numbers from the entry in the GRO Index, the copies are cheaper. Application forms are available from the Local Studies Library.

CENSUS – Locations

Original census returns cannot be viewed, but microform copies are available to consult:

Census returns 1841-1901 for England and Wales are at the Family Records Centre, 1 Myddelton Street, London, EC1R 1UW

Copies 1841-1901 for Yorkshire are at Leeds Central Library.

Copies 1841-1881 for the West Riding are at Wakefield Headquarters Library, Balne Lane, Wakefield, WF2 ODQ.

Copies 1841-1901 for the whole of the Bradford Metropolitan District are in the Local Studies Library. 1841, 1851, 1861, 1871 and 1891 for Yorkshire are available on CD-ROM, searchable by place.

Copies 1841-1901 for Bingley and Keighley are at Keighley Library. (Name indexes for Keighley 1851-1891 can be consulted at Keighley Library).

The Bradford Local Studies and Keighley Local Studies libraries now have a subscription to Ancestry.com, providing free access to the 1841-1901 censuses for the whole of the country at www.ancestrylibrary.com Please ask staff for details.

PARISH REGISTERS

Officially started in 1538, but in many places not until 1598 or later. They show baptism, marriage and burial, not birth and death.

The amount of detail varies considerably until the introduction of printed registers for marriages in 1754, and for baptisms and burials in 1813.

Many original registers have been deposited in Record Offices, such as West Yorkshire Archive Service: Bradford at Bradford Central Library, Prince's Way, Bradford, BD1 1NN. Some are still in churches and chapels.

Some have been printed, in Yorkshire often by the Yorkshire Parish Register Society, now the Yorkshire Parish Register Section of the Yorkshire Archaeological Society. A list of register copies in Bradford Library is available.

TRANSCRIPTS

From 1598 copies of registers had to be sent annually to the Diocesan Registry. At this time Bradford was in the Diocese of York, and the transcripts from 1600 to the mid 19th century (with many missing - especially in the first half of the 17th century) are at the Borthwick Institute, University of York, Heslington, York, YO10 5DD. Microfilm copies of the transcripts for places within Bradford Metropolitan District, except for those in the parish of Birstall, are in the Local Studies library.

MARRIAGE BONDS AND ALLEGATIONS

These were required when people married by licence rather than by banns. The licence would have been kept by the couple who were to marry, but the allegation, a statement made by the intending bride and groom, and the bond, assurances by bondsmen (usually friends or relatives), were kept at the Diocesan Registry.

Those for the Diocese of York, covering the years 1660 to 1950, are at the Borthwick Institute.

A series of volumes which index the Archbishop of York's Marriage Bonds and Allegations can be seen in the Local Studies Library at Y 929.34281.

NON-CONFORMIST REGISTERS

Some registers have been deposited in Record Offices and others are still in chapels.

Many non-parochial registers were collected nationally by the Registrar - General in 1840 and 1858 and are now at the Family Records Centre, 1 Myddelton Street, London, EC1R 1UW. Microfilm copies of these deposited registers for most places within the Bradford Metropolitan District are in the Local Studies library. They are included in the library's list of parish register copies. Microfilm copies of these registers for the whole of Yorkshire are at Leeds Central Library.

INTERNATIONAL GENEALOGICAL INDEX (I.G.I.)

This is an index, compiled by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, or Mormons, which covers many baptisms and some marriages up to about the 1880s. Many of the entries are taken from published or microfilmed registers. The microfiche index is arranged by country, then by county, surname and Christian name.

The entries for England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland and the Channel Islands are in the Local Studies Library (1992 edition).

MARRIAGE INDEXES

Boyd's Marriage Index contains entries for marriages in many parts of the country between 1538 and 1837, taken from parish registers which have been printed or copied. It is arranged by county, in 25 year periods.

Within each 25 year period names, sometimes of men and women together, sometimes separately, and sometimes men only, are listed alphabetically, with the partner's name, the parish where the marriage took place, and the year.

The original is at the Society of Genealogists, 14 Charterhouse Buildings, Goswell Road, London EC1M 7BA . Copies of the Yorkshire section, indexed under the man's name only, are at York Public Library, Museum Street, York, YO1 7DS and the Mormon Family History Centres at Huddersfield and Leeds.

Pallot's Marriage Index, Institute of Heraldic and Genealogical Studies indexes marriages and a very few births, principally in London, but also in other counties, between c1780 and c1837. It includes about 90 Yorkshire parishes. See www.ihgs.ac.uk

MONUMENTAL INSCRIPTIONS

Copies of tombstone and monumental inscriptions, covering about 120 churches, chapels, graveyards and a few cemeteries in the Bradford area, were made by Mr Arthur Blackburn c1930, and are in the Local Studies Library on microfilm. Most individual volumes are indexed, and a cumulated index has been compiled. The library also has copies of inscriptions in some other graveyards within the district.

CEMETERIES IN THE BRADFORD DISTRICT:

The burial registers 1854 to 1958 of Undercliffe Cemetery, a private cemetery in Bradford, have been indexed and can be consulted at West Yorkshire Archive Service: Bradford.

A name index is available on microfilm in the library.

WILLS

The proving of wills was an ecclesiastical responsibility until 10th January 1858 when it became a civil responsibility.

Most pre-1858 Yorkshire wills are at the Borthwick Institute, University of York (www.york.ac.uk/inst/bihr/), the chief exception being those from the Archdeaconry of Richmond (the western half of the North Riding and few parishes in the West Riding) formerly in the Diocese of Chester, which are at West Yorkshire Archive Service: Leeds, Sheepscar Library, Chapeltown Road, Leeds, LS7 3AP.



Indexes of wills from 1389 to 1688 at the Borthwick Institute have been printed in the Yorkshire Archaeological Society Record Series, Vols.4, 6, 11, 14, 19, 22, 24, 26, 28, 32, 35, 49, 60, 68 and 89. Manuscript indexes from 1689 to 1858 are available at the Borthwick Institute.

Wills proved at the Prerogative Court of Canterbury are at the Family Records Centre, 1 Myddelton Street, London, EC1R 1UW.

An index to all Prerogative Court of Canterbury Wills 1384-1858 can be searched on line at www.documentsonline.nationalarchives.gov.uk Copies can also be ordered from this site for a small fee.

From 11th January 1858 wills were proved at the appropriate District Probate Registry or at the Principal Probate Registry in London, which also received copies of all wills proved locally. The District Probate Registry for the West Riding was at Wakefield until c1968 when it moved to Leeds.

Annual indexes to post 1858 wills of England and Wales are published, and those for 1858-1943 are now at the West Yorkshire Archive Service : Headquarters, Wakefield. Later indexes can be consulted at the Probate Registry, Leeds.

Copies of wills and letters of administration from 1858 are held by Probate Department, Principal Registry of the Family Division, First Avenue House, 42-49 High Holborn, London, WL1V 6NP. (Personal visit or by post if date known).

ADMINISTRATIONS

If no will was left, letters of administration might have been granted. The bonds entered into by the administrators often still exist, and are usually to be found in the same places as wills.

DIRECTORIES

These describe a place and list its principal inhabitants, their occupations, and frequently their addresses. They can be used, as can the Burgess Rolls, to ascertain some addresses at the time of the census. They often include the dates when churches and chapels were founded, and the administrative areas in which places were situated. There are various directories for Bradford, the clothing district or the West Riding from 1792. A list of those in the Local Studies Library is available.

BURGESS ROLLS (and REGISTERS OF ELECTORS)

These annual publications list those who were eligible to vote in local elections from 1848 onwards, and in local and national elections from 1879 onwards. However, the registers in Bradford Library cover only those places which were within the Bradford Council boundary at the time:

1848 onwards	Bradford, Bowling, Great and Little Horton, Manningham
1873	Bolton
1882	Allerton, Heaton, Thornbury, Tyersal
1899	Eccleshill, Idle, North Bierley (i.e. Low Moor / Wibsey / Wyke areas), Thornton, Tong

Names are arranged alphabetically within wards (and polling districts) until 1883, thereafter in street order within each ward and polling district.

NEWSPAPERS

There are a number of local and national newspapers in the Central Library, including the Bradford (later Yorkshire) Observer from 1834 to 1956, the Telegraph (and Argus) from 1868 to date, and the Times from 1785 to date. A list is available.

A card index to local death notices and obituaries which appeared in the Bradford Observer between 1834 and 1909 has been compiled; it also contains a few entries for earlier and later dates. From the early 1920s cuttings about local celebrities of all kinds have been taken from local newspapers. They are filed alphabetically by name in the Local Studies Library. There is a printed index to The Times.

HERALDS' VISITATIONS

Pedigrees of armorial families were collected by heralds in the 16th and 17th centuries. Some of those which have been printed are in the Local Studies Library.



APPRENTICES' INDENTURES

An index to apprentice indentures between 1710 and 1774 (apprentices' names) and 1710 and 1762 (masters' names) has been compiled for the Society of Genealogists, and a microfiche copy is available in the Local Studies Library. It excludes apprenticeships, such as those arranged by the poor law authorities or those between members of the same family, where no payment was involved.

BIOGRAPHICAL LISTS

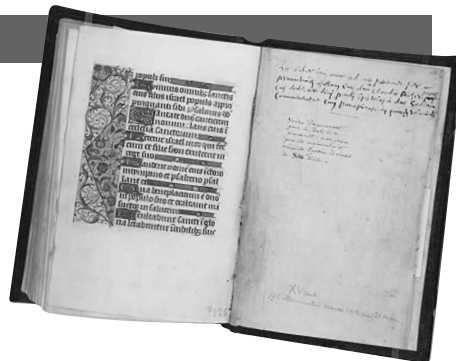
Many lists are available in the Central Library, such as the Dictionary of National Biography, J. Foster - Alumni Oxoniensis: the members of the University of Oxford between 1500-1886, and Army Lists from 1899.

SPEIGHT COLLECTION

Material relating to about 150 Yorkshire families collected by Harry Speight, 1855-1915, local historian and genealogist. Mostly rough notes. Held by West Yorkshire Archive Service: Bradford. A list is available.

DEEDS

Those relating to major property transactions in the West Riding from 1704 to 1970 were registered at the West Riding Registry of Deeds, and are now at West Yorkshire Archive Service: Headquarters, Wakefield:

DATES

Until 1st January 1752 the year began on 25th March, Ladyday, the last day of the year being 24th March. Thus 31st December 1683 was followed by 1st January 1683 – until 24th March 1683, then 25th March 1684.

CENSUS

Started in 1801, and taken every tenth year, but no details of individual people until 1841.

Confidential for 100 years; therefore 1901 is the latest census available for personal information.

Very useful in that birthplaces are given, and this can "bridge the gap" between Civil Registration and Parish Registers.

In 1841 gives name, age (but only to within 5 years for those over 15), occupation, whether born in county in which then living, or in Ireland, Scotland or abroad.

In 1851, 1861, 1871, 1881, 1891 and 1901 gives relationship to head of household (e.g. son, servant), condition (e.g. married, widow), age, occupation, birthplace, and in 1891 and 1901 only whether employer or employee.

Information in census returns is arranged by area and street, and not by name.
